#### Stop 1

"After you walk over a field, then you will cross over a wooden bridge and see a pine tree with a sign that says 'Prospect Hill Trail.' You can hear lots of birds. There are lots of ferns near the bridge."

## Stop 2

"There is a split tree thats roots look like a monster."



## Stop 6

"Grape vines kill trees by smothering their foliage. Their saving grace is that mammals enjoy feeding on wild grapes."


#### Directions

# History of Prospect Hill aka: "Blueberry Hill"


This land was originally owned by the Bradley family. In the early 1900's they pastured their heifers on the mountain. In 1974, one of the daughters in the Bradley family deeded the land to the town. This included an endowment fund for upkeep and maintenance of the site. Currently the Dummerston Conservation Commission and the trustees of PHP (5 community members and 5 Selectboard members) oversee care of the property. The 37 acre property is open to the public.

It is a costly project to keep the summit clear of invasive plants and the trail open. Donations are very much appreciated and may be dropped off at the town offices or mailed to:

Office of the Town Clerk, 1523 Middle Road, East Dummerston, VT 05346.

The trail to the summit is 6/10 mile long and is marked in white. At the western corner of the summit a post marks the entrance to the loop trail. The loop trail is a short trail and joins the summit trail at its half way point.
